The player is presented with an empty pit, when one by one, differently shaped blocks begin to fall into the pit. The player must fit the blocks together in the most compact manner possible to prevent the pit from overflowing. As each row is completely filled, it vanishes and any row above moves down. The game offers 10 levels of difficulty.

Allied Creative Engineers has released StratoZap (\$17), a game reminiscent of the popular Missile Command. You must destroy incoming missiles to save your cities. The program features graph-

ics and sound effects.
